

Report: I was her age.

April 12, Sunday – July 25, Saturday (105 days)
onboard Peace Boat's 87th Global Voyage,
Culminating in the 70th anniversary commemorations in
Hiroshima (August 6) and Nagasaki (August 9), 2015

A young mother is taking a stroll in the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park with her daughter. They encounter an elderly woman and the mother strikes up a conversation with her. It soon emerges that the elderly woman was in Hiroshima on 6 August 1945. After hearing some of her experiences from that day, the mother asks, "So, how old were you?" The elderly woman, gesturing toward the girl, replies.

"I was her age."

Over 15,000 children, aged 5-11, died in Hiroshima.

Over 5,000 perished in Nagasaki.

This year, as the world commemorates the 70th year since the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, *Mayors for Peace* and *Peace Boat* launched a unique collaborative project focusing on the child survivors of the bombings.

A Global Voyage for a Nuclear-Free World

Eight child survivors from Hiroshima and Nagasaki travelled the globe onboard Peace Boat's 87th Global Voyage, visiting 24 ports in 23 countries onboard Peace Boat's vessel, the Ocean Dream. During this voyage, they gave testimony at 25 cities in 19 countries.

Collaboration with Mayors for Peace

Events were held in host cities around the world which are members of the global network of Mayors for Peace, focusing on the child survivors meeting local parents with children who are now the age the survivors were in 1945, as well as their teachers. Poster sets and/or messages from the Mayors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki were delivered to 11 cities throughout the world.

Peace Boat Voyages for Peace and Sustainability

Peace Boat is a Japan-based international non-governmental organisation that works to promote peace, human rights, equal and sustainable development and respect for the environment. We pursue this through the organisation of global educational programmes, responsible travel, cooperative projects and advocacy activities in partnership with other civil society organisations around the world. Peace Boat carries out its main activities through a chartered passenger ship that travels the world on peace voyages, serving as a neutral, mobile space allowing people to engage across borders in dialogue and mutual cooperation at sea, and in the ports that we visit.



Global Voyage for a Nuclear Free World - Peace Boat Hibakusha Project

Peace Boat has been conducting "Global Voyages for a Nuclear-Free World" since 2008. To date, more than 150 Hibakusha (atomic bomb survivors) have traveled around the globe to appeal for a nuclear-free world. This marked the 8th Global Voyage for a Nuclear-Free World. The Hibakusha were accompanied by three youth activists who worked with them to spread the message of the humanitarian consequences of nuclear weapons and to appeal for a nuclear-free world. The Hibakusha and youth were appointed by the Japanese Government as "Special Communicators for a World without Nuclear Weapons" and "Youth Communicators for a World without Nuclear Weapons" respectively.

Cooperation of Mayors for Peace Member Cities

Peace Boat is pleased and honoured to work with Mayors for Peace and its local member cities in this historic project. As members of the network, these cities have pledged to make every effort to create an inter-city solidarity to achieve the total abolition of nuclear weapons and avert the recurrence of the Hiroshima and Nagasaki tragedies. They hosted the child survivors and organize activities to enable their stories to be heard locally and nationally.



A Significant and Historic Project

The 8th Global Hibakusha Project and I Was Her Age Project was held in the months proceeding the 70th anniversaries of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and serves as both a tribute to the Hibakusha and a reminder of the suffering that they have been through.


A Call to Action in the Midst of Rising Awareness

The projects take place in the context of an increased awareness and concern about the humanitarian impact of nuclear weapons to which the testimonies of survivors from Hiroshima and Nagasaki have contributed. Throughout the voyage the Hibakusha called on political leaders to support the Humanitarian Pledge (Austrian Pledge), which promised to "stigmatise, prohibit and eliminate nuclear weapons in light of their unacceptable humanitarian consequences and associated risks." Testimonies were given in the nuclear weapon states of Russia, the United States, France and India, for mayors, local officials and the community. The Hibakusha, together with Dr Kathleen Sullivan (Hibakusha Stories), called for enhanced collaboration with civil society, mayors and governments worldwide to drive further momentum for the beginning of negotiations for a treaty to ban nuclear weapons. A testimony event was held at Hofdi House, location of the US-Russia talks regarding the reduction of nuclear arms during the Cold War.

A Message to Future Generations

Creative means including poetry, song, theatre, readings, puppetry, clay animation, comedy, ventriloquism and more were explored in collaboration between the youth and Hibakusha, to pass the message to a wider audience. A documentary film will be released in August 2015, to preserve the message years after the official end of the project. This film, "I Was Her Age" will premier in the cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki on the occasion of the 70th anniversary of the bombings, and will be made available for public screenings in Japan and internationally. Social media has also been actively used to document the project in real time to a global audience, with posts regularly reaching more than 5000 people.

I Was Her Age and Hibakusha Project Activities and Events in 2015

Throughout Peace Boat's 87th Global Voyage, both onboard and in ports of call, the Hibakusha engaged in numerous activities in order to share their experiences and spread the message of peace. These activities include lectures, workshops, testimony sessions, press conferences, meetings with local or national authorities or NGOs and sharing sessions with local families. The timeline below shows an overview of activities conducted, including the special activities co-organised with Mayors for Peace (indicated with ).

	Reykjavik, Iceland 10 June 2015	"I Was Her Age" session with children and their parents at Hofdi House, where the 1986 US-Russia Summit on the reduction of nuclear weapons took place. Presented request for Iceland to support Humanitarian Pledge.

La Guaira, and Caracas, Venezuela 22-23 June 2015	Hosted by the Venezuelan Ministry of Foreign Affairs, meetings with Minister for Foreign Affairs, Minister for Education and other senior government officials. Unveiling mural in Vargas State to mark 70 th anniversary of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. A testimony session was also organized
Panama City, Panama 26 June 2015	Testimony for United Nations related representatives at the “City of Knowledge” site, a former military base now a centre for learning and culture. Together marked 70 years since the atomic bombings and the establishment of the UN.
Puerto Quetzal and Antigua, Guatemala 30 June – 1 July 2015	First presentation of testimony through ventriloquism with Spanish subtitles. Testimony for local civil society including women’s and indigenous groups.
Honolulu, USA 12-13 July 2015	Exchange and cultural event with local citizens groups including Hibakusha living in Hawaii, youth arts and UN Association of Hawaii. Visit to Pearl Harbour, followed by meeting with Mayor of Honolulu.
Yokohama, Japan 25 July 2015	The return of the 87 th Global Voyage to the port of Yokohama, Japan and Press Conference
Hiroshima, Japan 5-6 August 2015	Commemorative Events including report session and launch of film
Nagasaki, Japan 9 August 2015	Commemorative Events Peace Boat docks at the Port of Nagasaki – large scale event onboard
